Message from our CEO

"This was an impactful year at Action for Dolphins. Thanks to our incredible donors and supporters, we remain committed to long-term campaign strategies to achieve institutional change for dolphins and other marine animals."

This year's campaign highlights include **shutting down a dolphin meat supplier** from the Taiji dolphin hunts, **releasing an explosive report exposing travel companies profiting from the cruel hunts**, launching a large-scale financial impact campaign against Traveloka, and **mobilising dozens of volunteers around Australia for insights on dolphin and whale watching** in preparation for the launch of our Wild Dolphin & Whale Watching Guide.

The more people we can reach with our message to protect dolphins, the faster we will achieve long-term change. This year, we reached thousands of new people about the plights dolphin face at the Ocean Lover's Festival (recorded for <u>ABC's Big Ideas</u>) and on the <u>Ocean Protect</u> and <u>How to Protect</u> <u>the Ocean</u> podcast.

I also featured in an ABC documentary, <u>Dolphins: Is Our Love Too Deep?</u>, exploring the negative impacts of feeding wild dolphins in Australia.

This year we strengthened our partnerships to ensure a bigger, more coordinated movement to protect marine animals - including joining the Places you Love Alliance for stronger nature laws in Australia.

Thanks to these actions, the year ahead looks even brighter to achieve ongoing tangible change for dolphins.

At a glance dolphin captivity campaign

Our explosive '<u>Waves of Profit</u>' report, co-produced with World Animal Protection, reveals 6 global travel companies selling tickets to Taiji-linked dolphinariums around the world.



dolphin entertainment venues across 17 countries with links to Taiji

6,480 people were reached with a social media post exposing travel companies connected to Taiji



We launched a financial-impact campaign against Traveloka for selling to 9 venues linked to Taiji



Thailand is a key importer of dolphins from the Taiji hunts. We have begun working with a campaigner in Thailand to investigate a legislative ban on importing dolphins from Taiji.



In Australia, we are lobbying venues to end animal-visitor interactions and gearing up for a new campaign to end dolphin breeding in Queensland.

At a glance shark net campaign

Working with Sea Shepherd Australia, we co-produced '<u>Effective Shark Management For Your Community</u>' in New South Wales. This report outlines what an effective shark management strategy looks like to empower decision makers to remove shark nets.

Our Freedom of Information request to the NSW Government revealed hundreds of images of dolphins, rays, sharks and turtles that were killed in its lethal shark control program, and we used this evidence to boost awareness on the issue.




